Bryan Park Ponds to be Dredged !

The US Army Corps of Engineers announced in February that they would likely approve the City's application to dredge the two ponds in Bryan Park! This is great news!

Officially known as Upper Young's Pond and Lower Young's Pond, they have essentially filled up with sediment carried in stormwater from the Park's three main watersheds -- Upham Brook (which extends west to Staples Mill Pond, the Three Chopt and Ridge Road area, and parts of northwest Henrico); Jordans' Branch (which includes the Acca RR Yard, Westwood, and Willow Lawn area); and Princeton Creek, (which runs east through Bellevue and drains major portions of the Interstate Interchange).

The sediment in the ponds comes from decades of construction activities and streambank erosion in the watersheds, and may contain pollutants such as creosote, petroleum products, and nitrogen and phosphorus from fertilizers and animal waste.

Under normal conditions, ponds and feeder streams, wetlands and floodplains play important roles in reducing flooding, filtering sediment, and absorbing nutrients. When a pond fills with sediment its capacity to mitigate flooding and sedimentation is diminished. Furthermore, a shallow pond supports less aquatic life, because it gets colder in winter and hotter in the summer. Excessive nutrients cause algae blooms, which further reduces the dissolved oxygen in the water, causing dead zones. A sick or dying pond results in a stunted food web, and often sends the damage downstream.

In 1995, the City dredged the Upper Pond with help from Henrico County (which arranged for the dredge spoils to be disposed, providing a cost saving and an excellent example of inter-governmental cooperation). The Lower Pond has not been dredged in at least twice as many years.

The federal government's efforts to help improve water quality in the Chesapeake Bay include watershed restoration, nutrient reductions, and better stormwater management. This pond-dredging project is classified a Stormwater Management Project, paid for, in part, with funds from the City's Stormwater Utility, enacted in 2009. It will remove 100,780 cu. yds of sediment (imagine a football field with sediment piled more than 60 feet high) and annually remove about 1,900 pounds of phosphorous and 5,500 pounds of nitrogen, helping the City meet its pollution reduction requirements.

Additionally, the Corps will modify the Lower Pond dam and construct three sediment forebays, one at each tributary, to collect trash and sediment before it enters the main ponds.

The Corps' permitting process is rigorous, so construction may not begin for a year or more. We will keep you posted on the progress of this important project.



Unleashed Dogs in the Park

Unleashed dogs in the park is a touchy issue. There are people (especially parents with children) who won't come to Bryan Park because they are wary of the strange dogs that all too frequently run up to them. They write to the Friends of Bryan Park with their fears and complaints.

Others see their dogs as harmless, much-loved family members and won't leash them. Breaking the law and not caring about others using the park seems an entitlement.

For those of you who let your dogs off leash in Bryan Park (and you know who you are!) PLEASE begin to be considerate of others. Obey the leash law--it is there for a reason.

An Azalea Primer

During the month of March, Bryan Park's Azalea Garden lovers used their volunteer efforts to clean up winter's debris in anticipation of the Garden being open to automobile traffic from April 1 to May 15. To acknowledge this happy event, I thought I would share some general principles for being successful in growing azaleas.



- Azaleas prefer dappled sun all day or sun in the morning and shade in the afternoon. Hot sun will scorch the leaves, and dense shade will prevent blooming.
- Newly planted azaleas require lots of water during the first year or two.
- Azaleas thrive in an acid (around pH 5.5), well-drained soil.
- Because their roots tend to be close to the surface, azaleas need to have 3 inches of mulch (shredded pine bark is best) year-round under their branches.
- Azaleas don't need much fertilizer if they are growing in an acid soil with organic material. Since few of us have the ideal conditions, many gardeners recommend an application of Holly-tone (1 cup per plant) or equivalent in the Spring (April/May) after blooming and a lesser amount in October (1/2 cup per plant).
- When necessary, prune azaleas **ONLY** immediately after blooming. They begin to set buds for the next year soon after they finish blooming.

Purple Martin Houses in Bryan Park

Last year, FoBP and Adolph White, Purple Martin expert and Bryan Park's Purple Martin house care taker, placed two Martin houses near the dam on Lower Young's Pond.

The female Purple Martins' arrival date was delayed this year because of the off and on cold days that we experienced. As of March 25, only one male scout had arrived on schedule in Bryan Park. The scouts always arrive before the female Martins. The anticipated time of arrival for all male Purple Martins, which look for a place for their female friends to set up housekeeping, is in the middle of March. However, the females were delayed because the temperature was dropping too low for the development of the flying insects that they feed on. The one male Purple Martin who arrived in Bryan Park in mid-March stayed in the Martin house most of the time to conserve his energy and to prevent starvation. Adolph left some strips of fried egg for the lone Martin with the hope that it would not be eaten by other birds.



As of April 5, 8 to 9 Purple Martins were making their home in the Bryan Park Purple Martin houses. Adolph carefully monitors the houses daily. FoBP is fortunate to have this compassionate and dedicated gentleman watching after the park's Martins. As of May 15, 14 Purples Martins had settled into their new homes.

Purple Martins are fascinating birds. This is an ideal spot to observe and learn about these special creatures! Want to learn more? 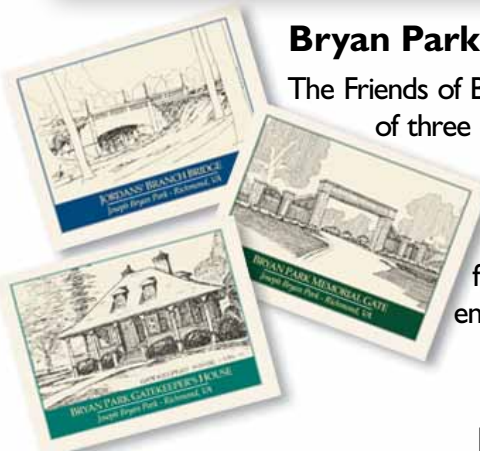

Bryan Park Tee Shirt

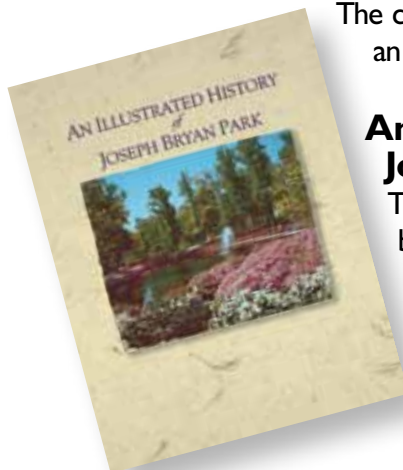
